### Executive Director's Report, 2012

I am delighted to speak as the interim Executive Director of PEERS Victoria Resource Society. Marion Little, PEERS' current Executive Director, is away on medical leave until September 3, 2013 and we all wish her a speedy recovery.

For those who are new to PEERS, we were founded in 1995 by and for sex workers with the support of community allies. PEERS is an impressive example of grassroots community development, providing programs and services to people who have been alienated and isolated from mainstream society because of their involvement in the sex industry. Many who participate in PEERS' programs and services are reluctant to access other social services, and many say we are the only place they feel safe and accepted. The people who have accessed our services tell us they have had their lives dramatically affected by PEERS in a profound and positive way.

PEERS Victoria is a registered Canadian Charity. Most of our funding is provincial, and the rest is contributed by charitable foundations, the local Health Authority, local service groups, community groups communities, and private donors. Our support base is diverse, ranging from local police departments and businesses to a variety of faith-based groups to people who advocate for the decriminalization of sex work. PEERS stands for health, safety and the human rights and dignity of all sex workers. We work endlessly to ensure sex workers' voices are heard and their basic needs are met.

PEERS and its allies organized its first ever Sex Workers' Rights are Human Rights Solidarity March that occurred on Saturday, June 8, 2013. This event was organized to show public support for Bedford, Lebovitch and Scott in their courageous fight against Canada's unjust prostitution laws. In attendance were several sex workers, community supporters, and Randall Garrison, Member of Parliament Esquimalt-Juan de Fuca. Speakers included Dr. Fran Shaver (Concordia University) and Lisa Ordell (PEERS' Board member). On September 28, 2010, sex workers and their allies celebrated Justice Himel's landmark ruling that would strike down three major Criminal Code of Canada provisions that in effect, make prostitution against the law – ruling that these laws violate the right to liberty and security that is guaranteed in Section 7 of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms. Himel's decision states that the harm done to sex workers through the criminalization of prostitution outweighs any harm done to the community. This decision was appealed by the Attorney General, and the case was heard at the Supreme Court of Canada on June 13, 2013. I had the fortunate opportunity to be present at this monumental event.

Reports follow from each of our board committees and from each of our staffed programs detailing the outstanding efforts of the entire PEERS team in 2012.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank each and every one of you for your dedication and heartfelt contributions that have made this organization what it is today. Without you, PEERS would not exist. I am honoured to serve alongside the PEERS staff, board, volunteers, and donors as we work together towards increased safety, justice, equity, and wellness in our community.

### **Board of Directors**

We are also very fortunate to be supported by volunteers from Saanich Baptist Church (their annual Spring Cleaning) and Temple Emanu-El Synagogue (Mitzvah Day: plants and flowers). ### Staff

Like many other non-profits, we continue to be challenged by the current funding environment. We recognize the efforts of all of our staff, who do a great deal with limited resources. We would especially like to thank Rebecca Taylor and Juli Savage for their hard work addressing the contract and billing changes in our daytime employment readiness program. Our Executive Director, Marion, has worked tirelessly to raise the profile of PEERS in the region and her warmth and passion for community development and collaboration is a tremendous asset within the organization. We would also like to congratulate Thea Cunningham of the Night Outreach Program for winning a Courage to Come Back Award this year. Finally, we were so fortunate in recent months to have the leadership of Lauren Casey during Marion's leave. Lauren is a PEERS staff alumni and a leader in the Canadian movement for sex worker's rights. Her positive presence at PEERS has not only inspired the staff and board alike, but also increased PEERS participation in and awareness of national collaborations among organizations across Canada – Stella, Power, Maggie's, BC Coalition, to name a few - who have joined together to promote decriminalization and increase safety and access to justice among sex workers in Canada.

### **Activism**

Red Umbrella Day is an annual day of action on violence against sex workers that always falls on December 17, and last year Sinead Charbonneau, Chandra Melting Tallow and Caitlin Gallupe organized PEERS' participation. We had lots of media coverage, and great support for the event from Discovery Coffee and Hernandez Restaurant. Another event that raised awareness about the conditions of sex work took place at Legacy Gallery during Crime Victims Awareness Week in April. This was a joint venture with the Somebody's Mother, Sister or Daughter sex workers' research project from the University of Victoria. We would like to thank Kevin Lastiwka for participating in the event and Todd Wellman and the entire Special Victims Unit for their ongoing collaboration with PEERS.

### Money matters

This year, we've supplemented the program funding we receive from VIHA, The United Way and the provincial government with a number of fundraising efforts, such as Hot Pink, an annual fundraising event made possible by donated entertainment from the Cheesecake Burlesque Revue. This year's Hot Pink event was a sold out show and our most financially successful to date and we have to thank Caitlin Janzen for her vision and countless hours of volunteer time. We would sincerely like to thank the individual and business donors who have supported PEERS and our public events this year. ## Finance Committee & Treasurer's Report, 2012

PEERS, like many grassroots nonprofits, has faced immense financial challenges over the last few years with annual budget contractions due to the current funding climate for charitable agencies serving our most vulnerable community members. In 2012 PEERS faced the daunting task of shifting to the Work BC Integrated Case Management billing contract for our Elements Program and Drop-In Centre from the previous direct funding through the Ministry of Social Development. This presented a significant challenge for staff to learn the new arduous ICM billing system while simultaneously running programming.

Despite these challenges staff have made the best of ICM and continue to persevere through these difficulties. PEERS finished the 2012 fiscal year end on target, with a small surplus and a small increase in budget from 2011.

In 2012 Executive Director Marion Little began the Dinner and Movie monthly donation campaign. The campaign is requesting members of the community to contribute what they would normally pay for a night out, \$20, \$50 or \$75 as a monthly donation to PEERS. If 800 members of our community decide to donate \$25 per month, PEERS could entirely fund the drop-in centre and Elements program and be freed from the politically based changes to funding we have experienced in recent years. We are excited to watch this campaign expand in the coming year.

## Human Resources Committee Report, 2012

In consultation with the Executive Director and the PEERS staff, the HR committee has been working on developing new policies and updating existing policies and practices to continue strengthening the work environment and service delivery practices at PEERS. There has been a focus on organizing development and wellness activities for staff, as well as updating key policies and practices that affect safety, violence prevention, hiring and conflict resolution processes.

The HR Committee has also been working on updating hiring policies in consultation with PEERS board and staff - new elements staff was hired this year, and we welcomed Lauren Casey as interim Executive Director. The HR Committee is committed to continue building a more supportive and

inclusive workplace at PEERS, and is looking forward to working on additional collaborative activities with the Executive Director and the PEERS staff in the coming year.

## Fundraising Committee Report, 2012

Fundraising at PEERS went well this year with several great fundraisers and ongoing help from our generous donors. Our major 2012 fundraiser was Hot Pink, which grossed over \$10,000 in one evening! We would like to thank the staff, contractors and volunteers who worked very hard to organize this event. We would also like to thank the many businesses who donated to our silent auction and bar. Of course, Hot Pink would not be possible without the hard work of the Cheesecake Burlesque Revue. PEERS is grateful for our continuing relationship with the Cheesecakes.

PEERS raised \$43,911 dollars in total from fundraising and donations from individual and corporate donors and we give a heartfelt thanks to these individuals and groups. PEERS' fundraising and donation revenue experienced growth in 2012 and we have the donors to thank for that.

We would also like to thank the *Ghosts of the Plaza* group, including Sarah Smith, Trinda Reed, Sadie Forbes, Wendy M. and the rest of the cast and crew for a wonderful play about the history of the Plaza Hotel and sex workers in the region, and for making PEERS a recipient of the proceeds in their 2012 and 2013 shows.

The Fundraising Committee has a number of goals this upcoming year. We are looking forward to another successful year of Hot Pink and we will continue to hold one annual fundraiser which is aimed at community education and awareness of the social service sector and issues related to sex work. In early 2013, renowned poet, artist and activist, Chrystos, donated a poetry reading and a number of items for auction to PEERS. This evening fundraiser raised close to \$2000 and was a powerful and rare opportunity to consider queer, indigenous and sex worker voices through the humour and beauty of Chystos' poetry. We will continue to look for opportunities to combine our goals of fundraising and public education through creative events in the remainder of 2013.

We are also looking forward to continuing to promote our direct donation campaign, which offers donors a chance to make a very significant contribution to PEERS with ease in smaller automatic increments. Finally, we will be developing a donor information package, which speaks to the value of PEERS in the community and our cross-sectorial partnerships. Alongside this booklet we are also gathering information to better understand our donor base, including their hopes for the organization.

#### **Successes**

The biggest program success is the ongoing collaboration between PEERS and several housing orientated services and organizations. Securing movers, financial assistance and damage deposits, household furniture and goods, plus joint advocacy with housing providers has increased the success of housing PEERS clients. The tenacity and support of many colleagues in social service agencies have been invaluable in keeping people housed and food secure however; chronic challenges in accessing services such as detox, stabilization, and rehabilitation for drug/alcohol/mental health/ and recovery concerns remains a consistent barrier for many. Throughout the past year many community collaborative events such as Project Connect and health treatment at Victoria Native Friendship Center and Access Health have been tremendously successful. In addition, our Public Health Nurse and Street Outreach nurses have provided prenatal care and administered flu shots, in addition to providing a site to host the annual Papapolooza event for women. Continuous support and daily collaboration from Pacifica Housing, Native Friendship Center, Cool Aid, Our Place, the Salvation Army, the ACT and VICOT teams, the Mustard Seed, AVI, and outreach from the Ministry of Social Development have been absolutely critical for supporting clients in housing and health. The ability of PEERS to provide the BC Housing Subsidy also makes a critical difference in client safety and financial realities, and their ability to be and remain housed in Victoria. The biggest program success is that several "challenging to house" women have secured affordable, safe, and secure housing.

### **Program Update**

The Drop-in Centre changed midway through 2012. The new Drop-in Centre Facilitator position was created in part to bridge the gap between night outreach and daytime. This has been successful as we are seeing an increase in night outreach clients accessing the Drop-in Centre more frequently.

With Yvette coming on board as our Volunteer Coordinator, we have developed a strong team of volunteers. The donation room (former board room) has been set up in a very organized manner, with easy access to supplies and goods. The library has now been set up in the outreach office for staff who wish to access resources.

Joanne continued over the year to provide knitting workshops on Wednesdays. Throughout November and December, we ran a Monday craft group where we made homemade gifts for people to give out for Christmas. A lot of people appreciated this, because it allowed them to give gifts, which they otherwise couldn't afford.
